We concluded the day with a wander through the streets of Boulevard Montmartre with a trip to the famous Hard Rock café where a selection of burgers, chips and ice cream was our prize.

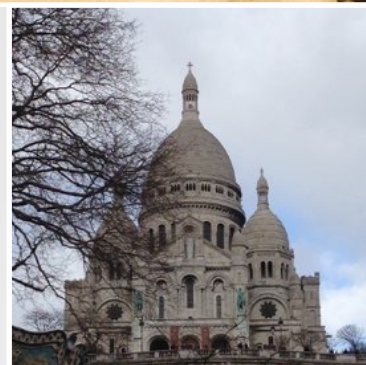
The first full day in Paris began with the continental breakfast that became the normal start to the day on the tour; by the final day students were dipping Croissants into their coffee, just like the Parisians! We then headed off on a coach tour of Paris and its landmarks. The tour guide was fantastic, and her knowledge of the architecture and historical events in this great city was fascinating. Musee D'orsay, a truly magnificent building, once a railway station, has been transformed into a vast space, where the collection of Impressionist works is second to none. The students' made many drawings and painted studies in their sketch books. After lunch, we pushed on to the Musee Orangerie with its stand out painting of water lilies by Monet. We followed this with a wander through the contemporary Art galleries and then on to Notre Dame, with its incredible stonework and stained glass, before going to a creperie for a double helping of crepes (savoury and sweet!).

On day two we went to look at twentieth century art in the Pompidou Centre, with exciting, moving and challenging installations, paintings, photos and the undefined, leaving a mix of emotions as the lasting impression. Selfie sticks at the ready we marched off to the Louvre to claim our prize of a shot in front of the "Mona Lisa" and then moved to the more serious matters of drawing from The Raft of Medusa and the French and Italian painting housed in Denon. We then headed back to Pigalle and a late night visit to the peace and tranquillity of Le Sacre Coeur(pictured).

Our final day in Paris saw no change to the weather with the cold getting more severe and we travelled over to the Musee Marmottan, a real gem and lesser known gallery, which has some of the best paintings by Monet, Morisot and Renoir in the world. A final drawing session and then off back to pick up our bags for the Eurostar home.

Many thanks to all who took part in the visit, who made the artistic endeavour enjoyable and rewarding for us all by behaving impeccably. Some truly magnificent drawing was made in sketchbooks and will no doubt feature in examination work and Mrs T. The baby's needs are based on a real baby that wants it's nappy changing, feeding or cuddles.



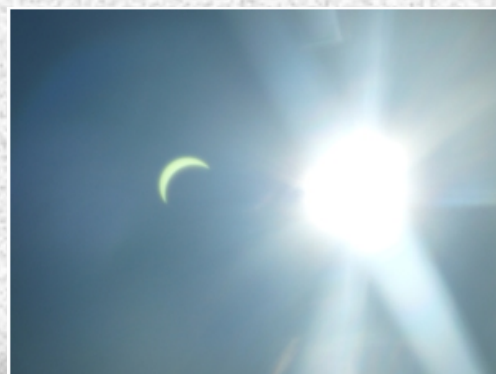

UKMT Mathematics Team Challenge

Last week a team of four Year 8 and Year 9 pupils travelled to Lincoln to represent the School in the Regional Final of the UKMT Mathematics Team Challenge, stopping on the way to experience the partial eclipse. The bright March sunshine became a fainter 'winter' light, but with the aid of a zoom lens we were able to capture an interesting secondary image.

As for the competition itself, 24 teams had gathered at the Priory City Academy to pit their wits against a series of fiendish mathematical problems, organised into the group round, the cross-number, the shuttle and the relay. Working either as a four or in pairs, our team of Lucy Freeman (8F), Kathryn Johnson (8F), Emily Hobson (9F) and Flo Husson (9F) acquitted themselves very well throughout, earning the final placing of 6th. The team from Caistor Grammar emerged victorious and will go on to the National Final, but our girls were pleased to have beaten a large number of mixed and all male teams from independent and selective schools in the region, showing a lot of potential for the future.



Year 12 Oxbridge Conference

On Friday 20th March a small group of Year 12 students, along with Miss Chant (Head of Sixth Form), attended an Oxbridge conference at the Priory Academy LSST. The day involved a variety of sessions with academics, current students and Year 13s who had just received offers, with the aim of raising awareness about what Oxford and Cambridge are looking for in applicants, how to make a competitive application and what studying the different subjects might be like.

I found having the choice of sessions really helpful. Although 'studying Computer Science at Cambridge' looked gripping, it was hardly relevant to the course I wish to study (History and Politics). I found attending the personal statement session particularly useful, as it aided my understanding of how it should be structured, as well as what aspects universities are looking for. I also had the chance to hear from two Year 13 students, both of whom had received offers to read History. It appeared the horrific tales of interviews are not a reality, which relieved many!

Personally, one of the main messages of the day which I took away was about how to make a competitive application for an Arts course which was explained by an Oxford Tutor. Although entrance is very competitive, he said: "people do get in". This stuck with me, as after all, offers must be given to someone. The conference made me realise that sometimes prospects such as this can be possible, although looking at the terrifying offer grades required it may make one think differently! I just hope with hard work and passion for my subject, I will be able to go to university one day. Attending the conference at the very least broadened my knowledge of the admissions process at Oxbridge, and assured me that university is a path I wish to take in the future.

English Department Trip to 'The Boy in The Striped Pyjamas' By Holly Parsons (8L)

On the 18th March, a group of Year 8 students visited Nottingham Theatre Royal, to see the production of 'The Boy in The Striped Pyjamas' adapted from the best-selling book by John Boyne. Set in 1943, we see World War II through the eyes of nine year-old Bruno who is the son of a concentration camp Commandant. He does not realise the horrors that are taking place behind the barbed wire fence next to his home or understand why the little boy he tries to befriend appears to be wearing striped pyjamas and cannot come out to play with him.

Having read the book and seen the film, I was very interested to see how the story would be staged. The set was on a revolving stage, which allowed us to see both sides of the fence. There was a screen backdrop informing us which chapter was being portrayed. Everything was kept simple with minimal set and few props, and the cast was small. We only knew how many people were in the concentration camp because Schmuell, the little Jewish boy, told us. This made the play different from the film because with less visual background information, the audience does not realise the full horror of what is happening until towards the end of the second half.

In my opinion, the actor playing Schmuell was the best as I think he showed the emotions of his character well.

Obviously there was far less detail than is possible in a book and therefore the play wasn't as upsetting as some of us had anticipated, but it was still a sad and shocking story. Overall the production was excellently done, and I very much enjoyed our trip and would like to thank the English Department for taking us.

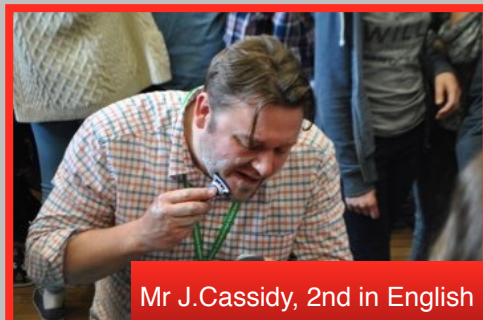
