
Growth Mindsets -Staff Inset day April 2015

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Dear Parent/Guardian

Welcome to the first Newsletter of the term.

Many thanks to all those parents who have, throughout the year at Parents' Evenings, completed a short survey. Your views are really helpful to us and we frequently make adjustments in school as a result of your feedback. Whether it's monitoring homework levels, making sure we are getting back to you quickly enough if you contact us or just making sure that our current systems work best for your children we do appreciate the time you take telling us what you think.

Every three years, like many schools, we use a slightly longer, more detailed, survey to ask you, your children and staff for their perceptions of the school. The results of these objective, externally analysed, surveys run by Keele University are shared with the school Governing Body and help to inform our school improvement planning.

Next week you will receive a survey from us and we ask that you find some time to complete it and return it to school, either in the post or via your child. Your child too, whichever year group they are in, will be invited to complete a pupil survey in tutor time, whilst some students have been selected to complete an extra, more detailed, Pupil Voice survey during the first half of lesson 1 on Monday.

We will report the surveys' findings to you later in the summer term so thank you in advance for the time you will take.

The sessions were deemed highly relevant to our students, who, with all good intentions, often appear to like to get everything 'right' and aim for 'safe' correct responses rather than sometimes taking risks and subjecting themselves to more creative and ambitious thinking. A 'growth mindset' leads students to greater resilience when the going gets tough (in life as well as the curriculum) and lots of educational research suggests that it leads to happier, more successful young adults. For teachers the links between good learning, pupils' personal satisfaction and their resilience are a key part of our everyday work.

We shall be continuing to explore some of the strategies with pupils over coming months but in the meantime included here is some of the advice for parents that a 'Growth Mindsets' model promotes. Like most things in education (and parenting!) it is common sense but we felt it was worth sharing.

Parent's Growth Mindset checklist

Do you want your child to be successful, happy and resilient? Sometimes we don't realise that words that we think encourage and praise can actually undermine your child's ability to become the best learners they can be. Every word or action sends a message to your child. Are you sending messages that suggest you are judging them or supporting them to learn and grow?

To help your child reach their real lifelong potential and be emotionally resilient try this:

Do	Do say	Don't	Don't say
Praise effort rather than focus on outcome	I'm so proud of how hard you are trying and how much you are learning	Praise their intelligence and talents – as if they are fixed	You must get 10/10 – it's the only result that matters because you are so bright
Give lots of feedback about how they have done and what they could do next – without criticising and judging	You have written such an exciting story – how about redrafting and checking some of the spellings I have underlined?	Judge their outcomes – either good or bad	You are so talented, I expected more from you OR This is full of mistakes you can do better!
Focus on what they are learning and developing and celebrate that	You have really tried hard with those sums – how do you work them out?	Make them feel all that matters is their scores and grades	You got an A that is brilliant You need to get good grades if you are ever going to be successful
Help them realise that mistakes are part of learning and you only learn by making mistakes and sticking at it until you can make progress	Did you find that book hard with all those difficult words – just think how much you are learning if you get through it all	Get upset if they can't do it – and show you think they are useless	Are you too stupid to read that book?
Model growth mindset yourself by sometimes getting it wrong and showing how you learn from it	I'm finding it really hard to learn a few Spanish phrases for the holiday but I'm going to stick at it!
