LINCOLNSHIRE YOUNG DESIGNER OF THE YEAR

Amy Phillips in Year 10 has been shortlisted for a prestigious competition being held by The National Centre of Craft and Design in Sleaford, her work will be exhibited at the Hub in the second week of July when the judging takes place.

As part of the GCSE Textiles course students were given a design brief to make an original sheath dress inspired by Indian culture using a number of decorative techniques. The brief stated that it had to be size 10, appeal to young women aged 16-25 and be suitable for sale in a High Street store.

Amy said "We had to design and make our garment from scratch, cutting the patterns from basic blocks, dyeing the fabric and in my case creating all the batik panels. I had to do a lot of research and different designs to find the best one to make. I really enjoyed the project from start to finish and feel very proud of my work. Although there were a few hiccups along the way as it is the first dress I have ever made. I have learnt a lot from this project and am very pleased with the results".

Amy spent many hours hand painting her Batik design and created an unusual cut away dress that reflected the shapes of traditional Indian clothing. We are now waiting with fingers crossed for the final judging which takes place on July 8th.

We're off to the NSEA NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS AGAIN FOR THE 4TH YEAR RUNNING!!

The school Equestrian Team competed at 'The College Equestrian Centre', Keysoe, Beds on Thursday 28th May. Only 4 riders could make it to this show jumping qualifier organised by Wellingborough School and 2 of them have qualified for the National Championships; Laura Finnegan of 11F (Advanced Open 1.10m individual) riding Silver Curtis and Emily Wilson of 8W (70cm mini & 80cm intermediate individual) riding Reflex Dharla. Laura Bates (9A) missed out closely coming 3rd in the 80cm. Emma Finnegan (7KG) had just 4 faults in the 70cm & 80cm. Laura Finnegan also came 4th in the 1m Open class.

All these riders have become experts at saving time in the jump off by picking where they can shave off turns or take another route. Hence they were all amongst the fastest riders there, which bodes well for our next event at Arena UK on 28th June.

I am pleased to say that I resisted the temptation to go over 'the line' and eat chocolate! Although it was



Creativity in the Curriculum

National Centre for Craft and Design (NCCD), The Tate and KSHSSA Students

KSHSSA students took up an exciting opportunity to visit the Tate Modern and Tate Britain on Friday 29th May. The event was organised by the NCCD and fully funded by the Tate ARTIST ROOMS project in response to the Centre securing an exhibition on loan of acclaimed Latvian American artist Vija Celmins. Her work is currently showing in the Roof Gallery and runs until the



28th of June. Each piece of work takes up to a year to complete and uses a variety of printmaking techniques to explore a range of subject matters including spiders' webs, the night sky and the ocean. The visit enabled the students access to 'The Salt and Silver' exhibition which displayed a collection of salt prints, the earliest form of photography, developed after the discovery of the use of chemicals to 'fix a shadow' on light sensitive paper coated in silver salts. The students were greeted by staff members from the ARTIST ROOMS programme who kindly gave up some of their busy schedule to answer questions from our newest recruits to the Young Journalist team. Along with a boat trip and lunch provided courtesy of the Tate and NCCD, the students spent

a relaxed couple of hours soaking up the visual treats of the Tate Britain. KSHSSA students thoroughly enjoyed the day and are excited by further projects facilitating art and creativity in the community.

Tate funding has also allowed the NCCD to install filmmaking and media equipment for the young people of Sleaford to use as part of their Young Designers project which encourages any young designers aged 12 to 25 years, to develop work in response to Vija Celmins' themes along with the added excitement of exhibiting their work within the NCCD's ExChange Space. If you enjoy photography and wish to have the opportunity to see your work exhibited in the Centre during the Celmins Exhibition, why not take a look at their current competition which invites you to take a photograph of the sky from a location of your choice. Keele Parents' Survey – Summary Findings

Many thanks to the parents of 239 of our pupils who found time to complete and return the recent parents' surveys.

Seeking the views of parents along with the views of other stakeholders is of real importance for informing our school self-evaluation process and plays a key part in our development planning for the year(s) ahead.

You particularly commented positively on the fact that.....

- Your child is well cared for at school.
- Your child enjoys school all or most of the time.
- You are satisfied with your child's progress.
- Standards of teaching are high and you think that the teachers keep good control in the classroom; teachers expect pupils to work hard.
- KSHSSA is achieving high educational standards; the vast majority of you say that you would recommend the school to friends; you firmly believe that the school maintains good behaviour amongst pupils and the school rules are seen as fair and reasonable.
- The school is a safe and secure environment for pupils.
- You pleasingly had little experience of dealing with bullying issues.
- You feel you are treated like a partner in your child's education, are given enough information about the school and find progress reports on your child useful; you regularly attend Parents' Evenings to discuss your child's progress.
- You think that the education that the school is giving your child is helping him/her to prepare for his/her future life.

You commented on these areas for the school to develop:

- A slightly lower than national percentage of you agrees that the school recognises and rewards good work or behaviour regularly or well enough.
- You would like to see opportunities for your children to take part in more 'out of hours' services.

So what next....?

Your comments help us form a focus for development next academic year. In the coming weeks we will keep you posted in the Newsletter as we start to make plans which address your suggestions.

Finally a big thank you to those parents who took time to write additional detail, whether that was to express your appreciation of individual aspects of your child's experience at the school or to comment on something you would like to see improved. These comments have all been passed directly to the Headteacher and have been read and digested.

We would like to welcome back the Year 12s for the summer term. It is a busy term for Year 12s as university and work place preparation becomes the focus.

On 8th June a university preparation morning was held. The morning covered the types of courses available and how to choose the right one; personal statements were discussed and Newcastle University provided some useful tips on how to write

an outstanding personal statement. University finance, types of loans and grants were also discussed.

Further to the university morning tutor times will now be directed towards UCAS applications, personal statement writing and Curriculum Vitae (CV) preparation.

In addition to tutor times Mr De la Bedoyere will be running several personal statement sessions in the computer suite to aid Year 12s in developing a 'stand out' personal statement.

A reminder that the Higher Education evening is approaching on the 30th June. This evening will provide parents/guardians with some essential information about the university application process and discuss university finance.

On a recent letter an Apprenticeship talk was advertised for the 18th June, however, this has now been rescheduled for the 16th July. Students will also have the opportunity to attend talks given by former students about Medicine (24th June) and English / York University / Gap years (29th June).

We encourage students to book university open days and school will authorise three days off for this purpose. Please can parents ensure that they write/email/phone school to let us know of the dates and locations of any open days that students are attending.

Year 11 Induction Days for Sixth Form

On the **25**th **and 26**th **June** Year 11 will get a full induction into sixth form life at KSHSSA. The two days aim to give students an idea of what it is like to be a sixth former, to meet with their Year 12 tutor and tutor groups and to experience lessons in their chosen subjects. The two day event will start on Thursday, 25th June at 9.00am, in the main hall, and it is expected to be finished by 2.30pm on Friday, 26th June. We advise that all Year 11 students attend this event if they have applied to KSHSSA for sixth form.
