GEOGRAPHY TRIP TO SHEFFIELD


As part of the World Cities aspect of our A Level Course, we learn about one out of town retailing centre. For this we have studied Meadowhall in Sheffield. We attended a talk by Lorraine McGreal about the site, location and operations of Meadowhall as an out of town retail centre. We learnt how Meadowhall was built on an old steelworks which closed in 1984 and that the centre is modelled on the Grand Palace design, which is intended to be timeless. However, we were surprised to hear that upon entering the car park a photo of the vehicle and driver were taken to check if the vehicle was stolen and criminal record checks were made on the driver.

After our talk and much to our delight we caught the tram to the centre of Sheffield where we walked the Gold Route which is part of Sheffield's regeneration scheme. In small groups we acted as tour guides to the rest of the class. Previously this area was heavily motorised; however, now there is an exclusion of all general traffic to create a safe, welcoming and attractive area which includes public art space and recreation facilities. We also viewed the water features which create a link with the historic Barkers Pool — the town's medieval water reservoir. We viewed some of the sculptures on the route, reminding us of Sheffield's history with the steel industry.

We then walked to the Park Hill redevelopment which is a 1960's

housing development which fell into disrepair. As the framework is a grade II listed building, it cannot be knocked down, so Urban Splash redeveloped it for modern day apartments. Although considerably better than the previous flats, the redevelopment created some mixed opinions amongst us all! Finally we took the tram back to Meadowhall where we had just enough time to evaluate Meadowhall and its facilities.

'Walpurgistag' Translation Competition



The life of a sixth-former is usually pretty intense, and just when I thought I had an evening off I unearthed an email from my German teacher about a translation

competition, run by the German Academic Exchange Service (DAAD) and Institute of Modern Language Research (IMLR), which involved translating an extract from *Walpurgistag*, a German-language novel, and sending my attempt back to the DAAD to be judged. The book itself, written by Annett Gröschner in 2011, takes a vibrant cross-section of the lives of ordinary Berliners on the 30th April 2010 - or *Walpurgisnacht*, to German readers.

Each category - I was in the 'schools' but there was also 'undergraduate', 'postgraduate', and 'others'- had its own passage to translate, ranging from pure dialogue written in a rather daunting dialect, to a surreptitious scene taking place on the corner of a busy Berlin street; the extract I found myself in front of.

By the nature of the novel, the passage was full of informal language that took some serious decoding, although eventually I'd completed the word-for-word translation and could step back and begin to rearrange the tangle of words into a more natural-sounding English story. Needless to say, this took some time! After a few hours (and many cups of tea!), I was sending the finished product off to the DAAD to be read and judged. I was incredibly surprised when a month later an email appeared telling me that I'd won the 'schools' category!

Attached were details of the prize; a year's subscription to the *Deutsch Perfekt* language magazine, along with an invitation to a prize giving event (in London!) on the 10th December, where the author and her translator Katy Derbyshire, would be discussing the book with the winners and an audience (it's open to the public too). I'm really looking forward to the event, an exciting prequel to the German Department's trip to Frankfurt.

SWIMMING GOALS AND COMPETITION

My name is Katie and outside of school I am part of a local competitive swimming club called Lincoln Vulcans. I've been swimming since I was 3 but only started swimming competitively when I was 9, as I found my love for this sport increased.

My short term goal is to get a qualification time for the East Midlands Swimming Championships, and my long term goal is to one day compete in national and international championships. But to achieve these goals means making sacrifices such as missing parties and school discos, early bedtimes and getting the right balance of carbohydrates and protein (not sweets or fast food).

I currently train 5 times a week, which can be either before school with a 5.00am start or after school. During each session my squad members and I do up to 5000 metres of intense swimming training and on top of this we also practice our techniques, such as diving and turns, and do land training (sit ups, press ups and other core strengthening exercises) to develop our stamina and muscles.

The 21st and 22nd November was the last local swimming meet before the Lincolnshire County Championships in January 2016. At this meet I was entered into 11 different races covering all four styles of stroke. I came away with ten medals; four golds, five silvers and 1 bronze, and reached the County qualifying times in all of them. Unfortunately I missed my short term goal of a Midland qualification time, but got within half a second in three different events. I am hoping to achieve this in the next four months before the entry window for the Midland Championship closes.

Whether I get the times or not this year I really enjoy swimming and spending time with the friends I have there (several are at KSHSSA too). We may compete against each other but we also do team events and it is a great environment. One of the main things our Coach tells us before every race is "enjoy it". There is no point making the sacrifices if it is not fun!

We were then split into groups to complete problem solving exercises. To finish off we had the chance to do some loading work. One task required us to fasten down a Land Rover with chains so that it would be safe to transport in a plane. In the last task we had to put cargo into a Chinook with certain restrictions. This soon turned into a friendly but animated competition between us and Carre's – we won!

Overall the visit enlightened us to what the RAF faces on a daily basis and showed us what really goes on behind the scenes. It was a great opportunity to experience this.

Using a range of decorative techniques such as appliqué, embroidery and patchwork students have stitched their story into the garments they have designed.

Freya Hide (12F) has used the memory of a walking holiday in the Lake District. Using a dress and pair of jeans she has constructed a sun dress and jacket covered in 3D flowers, hand and machine embroidered maps and images.

Rachel Clague (12A) used a very personal starting point connected with family bereavement with a dress and cardigan that she wore to the funeral, a shirt belonging to her father and a book of heartfelt messages. Rachel deconstructed the clothing and made a top and skirt, combining printed pages from her book of remembrance with appliqué and machine embroidery.

The garments completed by the girls and their sample sheets are on show as part of the Ruth Singer exhibition at the National Centre for Craft and Design (the Hub) in Sleaford until January 2016.
