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
Dear Parents/Guardians

Good weather and optimum conditions even allowed them to see the Northern Lights. My thanks go to Head of Geography Mrs D. Collett and her team of 3 other staff who organised and led the trip.

This week in school I have been delighted to attend subject award assemblies for each year group. KSHSSA GOES TO ICELAND

2016



On the 11th February 2016, 27 students and 4 members of staff set off on our long awaited visit to Iceland. This country is one of the most fascinating places on the planet and in a world of fire and ice, Iceland certainly delivered excitement, exhilaration and breath-taking beauty during our 6 day, 5 night exploration. The raw physical geography and geology of Iceland offered the opportunity to see first-hand a land of dynamic, exciting and pristine landscapes. Our trip encompassed a tour of Reykjavik, the Capital of Iceland renowned for its National and Saga museums, tracing Iceland's Viking history and the striking concrete Hallgrimskirkja church. We visited geothermal green houses and pools (The Blue Lagoon), where we swam in the geothermal waters and where some of us pasted our faces with the famous Blue Lagoon muds! We saw active volcanoes, volcanic craters, cascading waterfalls, the mid Atlantic ridge and the bridge between two continents. We were privileged to witness the awe and wonder of erupting geysers, bubbling mud pools as well as breath-taking glaciers, mountain ranges, geothermal features and basalt rock columns which were formed by undersea volcanic eruptions thousands of years ago. On our fourth night we witnessed the spectacle of aurora borealis, which I know for many were one of the highlights of the visit. To top it all off, we learnt so much from our expert guide and became educated on some centuries-old Norse culture and society including magical fairy tales and folklore.

Their politeness, punctuality and outstanding behaviour earnt them positive comments wherever we went - well done KSHSSA, so.....where to next?

BAE Systems Science Roadshow

On Monday 8th February, Year 7 and 8 students had the opportunity to watch a Science Roadshow delivered by the BAE Systems Education Programme. The presentation featured demonstrations and activities to help students understand the similarities and differences between sound, water and light waves. The students were shown examples from within BAE Systems, the RAF and the Royal Navy, where knowledge of different wave types is exploited by engineers to solve problems. Both students and staff were invited to participate in some of the experiments and they were able to make some strange sounds using unconventional instruments! They also discovered how light waves can actually make objects disappear and they created water waves without actually touching the water!
