

### **Sixth Form News**

We are pleased to welcome Year 12 back after their AS examinations. This term is very busy with lots going on! They will start studying topics and developing skills that will be examined at the end of Year 13 and so lessons will continue as normal until the end of term. Students undertaking the Extended Project should use the next few months to really move forward on their projects as these will be due in in September. In tutor times students will start focusing on their plans for when they leave school next year. We will explore varied paths open to them such as apprenticeships, careers in the armed forces, employment and taking a Gap Year, as well as university. Research is the key to making the right decisions so we will encourage all students to look at the different options available to them and weigh up the pros and cons of each. # **Lincolnshire Young Designer** of the Year

Three Textiles students have been selected for this years' Young Designer Competition. Their work will be displayed in the Roof Gallery at the National Centre for Craft and Design over the weekend of the 2-3 July. The winners will be announced at a private view on Friday 1 July.

Freya Hide (12F) designed a woman's jacket as part of her AS portfolio based around the theme of modern architecture, taking inspiration from the work of modern practitioners including the likes of Frank Gehry, Zaha Hadid and Renzo Piano. Freya says "In many initial drawings by these individuals, a range of angles are used, showing mathematical precision. This is also evident in the buildings themselves, with many including aspects such as structural beams, and glass panels - which give the structures a sense of regularity. Such regularity is often juxtaposed by the inclusion of curved surfaces. It is this juxtaposition of lines and curves that I wanted to be evident in my jacket design, hence the heavy reliance on pleats to give regularity and structure, along with the draping of the fabric making up the scarf and hood, to give a sense of fluidity and contrast".

Amy Phillips (11L) has been selected for a second time (her work was short-listed last year too!). For her GCSE

coursework Amy chose the context of the fashion style 'shabby chic' having to create a textile product using a range of materials, including discarded clothing and components, and suitable to be sold in high street stores. "After designing five initial ideas, I singled one out, and developed it further. Once I had my final idea I then had to gather the materials to make it. First on the list was a wedding dress, which I obtained from eBay for £10. I then found a pastel pink lace dress in a charity shop in Edinburgh. I disassembled these and combined them with locally sourced materials and a lot of hard work to create my final piece, a 'shabby chic' party dress".

Megan Grimmer (10F) has submitted work produced for her first mini-coursework, the brief being to design and make a corset top suitable for selling at the High Street chain of stores, Monsoon, using decorative techniques from India. The top needed to be suitable for a younger customer aged 15-25 years. "My bustier top is made of hand dyed cotton. It is cropped and boned to give a younger feel to the design and has beading and hand embroidery on the centre front. The cups are outlined in hand beading. The back is fastened with an open ended zip. The whole garment is lined. I cut the patterns myself and made the garment which was quite challenging; I am very pleased with the result".

# Hoax Calls – Advice from the National Counter Terrorism Security Office (NaCTSO)

Following a number of hoax bomb calls to schools across the UK in May, NaCTSO has provided the following update as each call has caused significant disruption to school life, upset to school staff and concern to students, their parents and carers.

The police treat calls threatening bomb attacks very seriously and are committed to working with schools to ensure the safety of all students and to minimise disruption to their learning.

It is important that we are alert but not alarmed. Schools remain some of the safest and most secure public spaces; the wellbeing of students is the top priority of staff.

To help us we ask the following of you:-

- If the school makes a decision to temporarily suspend lessons while safety checks are carried out, do not attend to remove your child unless asked to do so. Schools will keep you informed and always arrange care for students unable to return home or whose parents/carers are unable to collect them. Do not phone the emergency services to ask for updates on your child as it delays genuine people in need from getting help.
- Consider speaking to your child about the consequences of making hoax calls.
- If you have any information about those responsible for the security alerts call police on 101 (999 in an emergency) or the independent charity Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111.

### Armed Forces Reserves Day – Change of Date

Due to the date of the EU Referendum there is a change of date for the Armed Forces Reserves Day, a day when students and staff may attend school in their Cadet or Reserves uniform. This day was due to be held on Wednesday, 22 June but it will now be held on <u>Thursday</u>, <u>8 September</u>.

Formerly known as 'Uniform to Work Day' this is a perfect opportunity for us to recognise the sterling efforts of our Staff and Students outside of School as well as increasing awareness of the Reserve Forces within our community.
