# MATHS INSPIRATION - WHAT'S THE POINT OF MATHS?

On Monday 27<sup>th</sup> June a group of Year 9 and Year 10 pupils went to Leicester's Curve Theatre to attend a Maths Workshop.

The day, hosted by Matt Parker, was extremely enjoyable and informative. The first part was with Rob Eastaway and Ben Sparks, who took it in turns to show why they felt Maths was important in everyday life. They had many activities, which involved volunteers, including one called the 'Greedy Game' and even a Maths-related magic trick.



The second half was taken by Lisa Collins from Lincoln University who combined her love of Maths and Biology to study animal behaviour. She had many interesting stories from her job, such as how Maths could be used to explain chicken behaviour and predict character profiles for pigs. Did you know chickens in huge barns do Mexican waves?

All in all it was a great day and everyone thoroughly enjoyed themselves.

# MATHS WORKSHOP

On the afternoon of Wednesday 29th June, Year 8 were given an exciting opportunity to learn about Maths in a more unusual way.

Dr Katie Steckles of Manchester, a mathematical speaker, spent the afternoon demonstrating ways in which shapes can be found all around us. For instance, she started the workshop with a simple hand trick – if you hold your hand out in front of you, palm down, can you flip it the other way without twisting your wrist?

The next part of the workshop consisted of most people trying to turn upside down. However, after several minutes of this, Katie

showed everyone the solution, which involved the use of elbow joints and making 90° gesticulations. The point of the exercise was to demonstrate how spheres can work in the same kind of way; if you were to start at one point on a sphere, and make the same 90° turns shown in the hand trick, you would end up where you started.

The next part of the workshop involved some crafting – Katie handed out strips of paper, scissors and sticky tape and showed everyone how to make "Mobius bands". A Mobius band is made by making a circle out of a paper strip, then twisting one end in either direction. Once



everybody had their own Mobius band, Katie demonstrated how interesting they could be. For example, by cutting along the middle of the Mobius bands, a large paper circle was created. What was even more impressive was by joining two Mobius bands that were twisted in opposite directions at a right angle, a square was

formed. The final trick gained a collective "aww" from everybody in the room – by joining two Mobius bands at a perpendicular angle and cutting along them, a pair of interlocking hearts were made.

The final, and arguably most impressive, instalment of the afternoon revolved around smoke

rings – the idea was to show the process of how vortexes inside tori (doughnuts) spin in one direction around an imaginary axis line, forming a loop. It was demonstrated in the form of smoke rings because they are visible to us, and therefore everyone was able to see how the vortexes work.

The afternoon was very interesting and I feel that it gave everyone, even those who don't necessarily enjoy Maths, a more open mind towards the subject.

The Judges are: Sam Mendes, Jess Moore, Caro Newling and Mark Thompson.

The winner from each category will be invited to London to meet the creative team and to watch a matinee performance of 'Charlie and the Chocolate Factory', before experiencing the production from backstage during the evening performance.

The Young Theatre Design Award looks for those who have already experimented with set and costume design, and also seeks out aspiring artists and those with relevant skills who have not yet considered a career in the theatre industry.

Matilda had designed an outfit for a female Willy (Willa) Wonka as part of her GCSE course and we submitted photographs of her finished outfit, the bodice and applique on the skirt of which are made of machine embroidered sweet papers.

The winners will be announced on Friday 15th July.
