

We are delighted to welcome the award winning **FIND YOUR VOICE** to the school for the first time this year for an afterschool club available to parents should they wish to pay for a place for their child.

Places are available initially for Year 7 girls.

FIND YOUR VOICE classes offer the chance to learn to communicate well and speak to an audience with confidence.

Two sessions will run on Tuesdays from 3.45-4.30pm and 4.30-5.15pm and class size is limited to 15 students.

Sessions are varied and exciting - including wordplay, debate, speech writing, games, conversation, rap, poetry and prose. All participating students have the opportunity to gain nationally recognised certificates in a variety of communication skills from the London Academy of Music & Dramatic Art (LAMDA). The first block of sessions will start after October half term at a cost of £48 for the six weeks. Thereafter parents are able to pay for blocks of 10 weekly sessions at a current cost of £80 a term. Rain, rain go away, because it is Resilience Day



On Friday the 16th of September, Year 7 took a day off of their normal timetable to take part in an RAF-organised Resilience day, which was a special event to help new students improve their organisation skills, work on team building exercises and gain 'tips for life'.

In the morning, 7W and 7L had a very wet start to the day as they were outdoors doing orienteering in the rain. They were busy not only learning about team building, but they were exploring the school grounds in the hopes of improving their knowledge of the layout of school. Kavita Walsh (7W), said "I enjoyed the orienteering because it was really fun and I learned more about reading maps. I really liked today as a whole because I have learned some new skills and also how to stay positive."

In the afternoon, forms 7A and 7F were in the main hall to take part in a workshop by Jasper Ward from 'Maximise Your Potential'. He told a series of funny anecdotes about his own life to show how you should always seize the moment, and how to get motivated to do something you believe in. He used real life

examples such as Louis Hamilton to show the Year 7s how they can achieve great things. When we spoke to Jasper, he said "look at one or two people who have gone out and changed the world; right now we feel like we're ordinary people in a fairly ordinary school, but people from ordinary houses, ordinary backgrounds, can go and change the world too."

The Year 7s agreed that the day was extremely enjoyable and motivational - even though the weather was less than pleasant!

We were recently awarded the Foundation International School Award Certificate from the British Council as recognition of the internationally themed work we do and, in particular, for our work during the run up to the Referendum on the UK's membership of the EU. ARCHERY

On Target!

Congratulations to Emily Coughlin (11F) who came 5th in the ladies U16 Recurve at the Outdoor Archery Nationals. Emily was just 8 points from 3rd place, which is 1 arrow! This was a big improvement from last year when she came 15th.

Emily shot a personal best on both days – day 1 was a metric round which for her age group involved shooting:

- 36 arrows at 50 metres
- 36 arrows at 40 metres
- 36 arrows at 30 metres
- 36 arrows at 20 metres.

Arrows were shot in ends of 6 (i.e. 144 arrows in 24 ends). Her personal best for this is 1236 out of a total possible score of 1440.

Day 2 was an imperial round and involved

- 72 arrows at 50 yards
- 48 arrows at 40 yards
- · 24 arrows at 30 yards

Emily currently shoots for both Lincolnshire County Junior Team and EMAS Regional Junior Team. She is a member of Sleaford Maltster Club, where she trains twice a week. She has been shooting for 3 years; in winter she shoots indoors and in summer outdoors, with between 2 and 4 competitions a month.

Pony Club Tetrathlon Championships 2016 - Junior Girls

Over the summer, Laura Bates (11A) took part in the Pony Club Tetrathlon Championships. This challenging competition required its participants to run, ride, swim and shoot.

Laura entered in the Junior Girls Individuals and came third! She was up against over one hundred other competitors.

"I didn't realise I had come third – I didn't even look at the results and then one of my friends came up to me to tell me I had come third. It didn't hit me until I was on the podium and they gave me the prizes.

My favourite part of the competition was probably the riding section. I didn't ride my own horse because he went lame, so I rode my friend's horse instead, which was really fun. If I had to pick my least favourite part of the competition it would be the shooting, as it's quite a lot of pressure because everyone does it at the same time in a large hall.

I would definitely tell people to get involved with the tetrathalon because you get to meet lots of new people from Ireland, Scotland and Wales."

I have been involved in running the Award since 2007 for the Air Training Corps, and since 2014 for KSHS. I am thrilled to be working within the Trust for both schools from September 2016.

This year at KSHS we registered 62 Bronze from Year 10 and 26 Silver from Years 11 and 12 along with 18 Golds from Years 12 and 13. These participants have been trained and planned their practice and qualifying expeditions in Lincolnshire, the Lincolnshire Wolds, the White Peak Area of Derbyshire, Dark Peak Area of Derbyshire and the North Yorkshire Moors.

Our information evening for registration will be held in the KSHS Main Hall. (Letters regarding this will have been sent out and have been included in the external applicants 6th Form packs).
