Year 7 Roman Day



On Wednesday 28th and Thursday 29th September, the Year 7 students travelled 2000 years back in time to experience life as a Roman. All of the girls dressed in Roman clothing – togas and tunics (eager to win the costume competition!) – and spent the morning engaging in Roman crafts, then in the afternoon, a Roman feast.

Perfumes, mosaics and wax tiles are just some of the things that the 'Romans' made. Students had the opportunity to make charms for strength, courage and cleverness (bull, lion and owl for each respectively) – they used clay and attached the charms to a leather strip. There was also the opportunity to make oil lamps from crushed olives and these were burnt throughout the morning. Eight students also had the chance to be slaves, they wore yellow sashes for the day and spent the morning spreading gossip to the other students. The main gossip for the day was regarding how Boudicca had been rebelling against the Roman rule of Britain and how she was captured by the Romans several times before eventually poisoning herself.

During the afternoon the Romans split into five groups – soldiers, dancers, slaves, and two groups of actors. The soldiers put on a display of some of the Roman defence and attacking positions, including the tortoise and the wave. The actors performed a play each; one being the hare and tortoise and the other the myth of Medusa. They used narrators to tell the story while the others acted out each of the characters. The dancers choreographed a routine telling the story of the battle in which Boudicca was eventually captured. These four groups all performed their thrilling dance during the feast to provide entertainment. Slaves were even in charge of setting up the hall for the feast under the command of Maximus, the Roman leader, and they obediently served everyone with 'wine', bread and cheese in between each of the acts.

The students learnt a lot about Roman culture: Grace Coaker commented that she will 'remember Maximus, the 'leader' and teacher for the day, as he really took on the personality of a Roman.' She also said 'it was cool; there were lots of fun, practical things to do and learn about. My favourite part was creating the wax writing tablets.'

She says 'Over the summer I have been having conversations with about 10 colleges and recently cut it down to 3 that I'm going to visit and following this trip I have to choose 1 with the intention of signing a letter of intent in November. I'm visiting SMU in Dallas, the University of Utah in Salt Lake City and Boise State University in Idaho. They are all division one for cross country and track and all are nationally ranked for this cross country season. From a running perspective, all are very positive and I'm going with an open mind.'
