You may have seen the recent coverage in the media about the concept plans for a proposed new grammar school in Sleaford. This is a project that the Robert Carre Trust has been working on for a number of years as part of the Sleaford Regeneration Group, in conjunction with North Kesteven District Council and Lincolnshire County Council. Whilst this is an exciting opportunity for the schools and the town it does requires a substantial investment of around £30 million before it becomes a reality. Without this, the idea of a new state of the art parkland campus to serve 1600 students is a very long way off and given the current funding crisis in the public sector, it is clear that we have much to do and several avenues to pursue. The Trust has created some indicative drawings showing what the school could look like on the site we have in mind, which is just outside the Sleaford by-pass. Some of these drawings are shown above and they have also been attached as a separate PDF.

The Robert Carre Trust was invited to a pre-planning meeting by NKDC at which it presented the vision and drawings. The next stage is to go to a wider consultation which will include parents, students and all other relevant stakeholders within the town and the wider community, exploring the benefits of co-locating the current schools onto a new site. This will happen in the coming months and it will be good to hear your views as we look to shape the future education for the young people of Sleaford and its environs.



Year 12 Philosophy and Ethics Conference at Cambridge



On the 2nd February, a few of the Sleaford Joint Sixth Form's Philosophy and Ethics students, along with teachers Miss Bird and Mrs Bence, were lucky enough to have the opportunity to travel to Cambridge to hear Peter Vardy, as well as guest Dr David Webster from the University of Gloucester, at one of the 'candle conferences'. The session Peter Vardy presented went into great detail on a range of topics; arguing for the existence of God — mentioning renowned philosophers Anselm and Aquinas, Religious experience and the ethical theory of Natural Law, whereas, the



guest speaker Dr David Webster debated the logical and evidential problem of evil. The conference proved to be incredibly useful in terms of revision, with mocks coming up we were able to fully explore some of the main aspects of the course we've been studying, along with learning some new opinions and ideas that could develop our answers; such as Kant's theory of aesthetics and the gripping story of how a young girl in a concentration camp found God in the beauty of nature.

The conference acknowledged the exam board's specification and skills needed and highlighted the major factors we should consider when writing our essays, especially the need to evaluate the ideas. In the five hours, Vardy and Webster allowed the time to include two debates – not only did this allow us to interact, but everyone felt refreshed and woken up due to the interactive debate of very conflicting opinions. The main debate focused on the issue of euthanasia and whether it was the 'most loving thing to do'. From across the three schools, a huge contrast in opinions were shown all stemming from a clear common interest in philosophical debate.



Not only did the conference allow us to develop our debate skills and way of thinking, but we were able to explore the city of Cambridge. The breaks and time for lunch provided allowed us to explore parts of the city, and with the conference located in the rather beautiful Methodist church in the centre of town, it was the perfect spot for doing so!

The second half of the conference focused on Natural Law and the laws that govern the universe. The final debate offered a chance for contemplation on whether there was a definite purpose/aim to human life anymore. Many arguments ensued, but one student mentioned our purpose was simply to reproduce and carry on the species. My personal highlight was Kant's theory of aesthetics and the idea that there is evidence for God in the purity and beauty of the world we live in.

The day proved it was evident that Ethics and Philosophy is relevant to society today and demonstrated to all students that contemplation is significant in the world we live in, as well as being open minded enough to acknowledge other people's thoughts.

SCIENCE LIVE

On Thursday 9th February the Science Department took 38 Year 10 students to Sheffield for 'Science Live'.

The students were given the chance to see and hear five of Britain's top scientists, all working at the cutting edge of their specialisms. These included Professor Robert Winston, Professor Alice Roberts, Professor Jim Al-Khalili, Dr Simon Singh and Professor Steve Jones.

It was a very interesting day and hopefully inspired our students to become the ground breaking scientists of the future.

On Thursday 9th February some of my friends and I went to Sheffield City Hall to see a series of scientists give talks.

The talks were about a variety of topics, from the Big Bang to evolution and fossils. The scientists were very engaging because they targeted the content towards our age group and kept things light-hearted with the occasional joke. More than anything, the scientists opened our eyes to new areas of science that we otherwise wouldn't be taught in school which I found really valuable.

My favourite of the talks was Dr Simon Singh's lecture about the Big Bang theory and how scientists proved that the Big Bang may explain the creation of the universe.

Alice Roberts is an anatomist and biological anthropologist, author and broadcaster. In the last decade of the twentieth century, she studied medicine and anatomy (MB BCh BSc) at Cardiff University. She worked as a junior doctor in South Wales, before becoming a lecturer at Bristol University, where she taught anatomy on the medical course for eleven years.

Possibly the most useful part of the day, however, was the talk from an examiner who gave us great advice on what to do and what not to do in exams.

Overall, it was really good fun and a great learning experience.



Flair for International Fashion

On Wednesday 8th February a team of 6 Year 10 Design and Technology Textile students from KSHS attended an exciting cross curricular challenge event 'Flair for International Fashion' which combines Modern Foreign Languages skills with international fashion and business. The event was held at Nottingham Girls' High School and was organised by Business Language Champions.

The students were divided into two bilingual teams with students from other schools, Leicester High School and Montsaye.

The day was structured around global fashion branding and included a very interesting lecture by Ena Brown, principal lecturer for International Fashion at Nottingham Trent University.

The students took part in an international fashion challenge, finding a gap in the market for a new range of jeans. Market research had to be planned and carried out in their nominated language – no English allowed, quite a challenge!! Jeans were designed and a Power Point Presentation created again in their foreign language illustrating their market research and branding solution, this was then presented to the judges – this called for teamwork with students they did not know and a huge amount of confidence in delivering their ideas. Whilst the presentations were taking place students worked on a social media campaign creating advertising posters around a chosen celebrity endorsement.

Team Jigsaw (French and Spanish), Elizabeth Keetch (10L), Bebe Doungpompho (10A) and Amecia Ruddle (10L) came a very creditable joint 3rd against very stiff opposition. Team Next (French and German) Hollie Chessum (10A), Robin Hodgson (10F) and Hannah Charlton (10A) achieved the joint highest marks for their market research.


GEOGRAPHY COMPETITION


