'Box Clever Theatre' brings Frankenstein to KSHS

On Friday 13th October – a very fitting date - the Year 9 students were paid a visit by a unique company called 'Box Clever Theatre' who claim that their 'mission is to bring exciting theatre to young people' and they certainly did that at KSHS!

The company was represented by three brilliant actors who gave us an incredible performance of Mary Shelley's gothic literature classic 'Frankenstein', which the Year 9s will consider when they study the 19th Century gothic novel later this year. The show was outstanding and had many amazing scenes. The way the trio used their space to build tension and fear in their audience was brilliant, as they only had floor space and a few simple props such as a hospital bed and two curtained screens; their expressionism was so good that they didn't need complex props or costumes. Some of their dialogue, often delivered in soliloguys and monologues, was

presented directly to the audience, which kept us on our toes

and made several girls jump out of their seats.

Even if you knew the story of 'Frankenstein' and the misunderstood monster created by an inspired scientist (whose name *is* Frankenstein – that isn't the monster's name!), the way Box Clever Theatre performed it almost made it their own novel. Actors represented different characters for different scenes, including Mary Shelley herself, who we saw 'inventing' her plot as it played out in front of her. This meant we got to see her making the difficult choice of how to end her complex storyline – and how to end her characters, by choosing whether they met their ultimate demise or not.

Having seen the play, I believe that I understand the story and the plot much better. I thoroughly enjoyed this experience from both a literature and drama perspective.

DUKE OF EDINBURGH AWARD CELEBRATION EVENING
