Here are a couple of ideas: Dial the Emergency Services without alerting someone: This article in the Independent newspaper shows you how to dial the emergency services and alert your emergency contact without someone knowing. Sometimes young people can get into a situation where they feel uncomfortable or unsafe. They frequently feel that they need to save face and feel that they cannot phone home. One solution is to agree a code word or sentence that they can text to you that means please come and pick me up asap I will explain later. You can then text back saying that I need to pick you up now because....... This way they get out of the situation but still save face. For older teenagers there is an initiative in some towns and cities called 'Ask for Angela'. If a person is feeling vulnerable or threatened go to the bar and ask for Angela – the bar staff will then take you out of the pub/club a different way to keep you safe.
