Happy New Academic Year to all parents and friends of the High School

I hope you and your family got the chance for a relaxing break this summer. Its been lovely to welcome students back into school and of course to welcome our 146 new Year 7 students as well as students new to the school in other year groups.

I hope this first newsletter of the term provides some useful information at the start of this academic year.

Site

The site team are always at their busiest as soon as students leave the building with their annual programmes of redecoration and school maintenance. Most work this holiday in addition has centred around the installation of a brand-new boiler system after a successful bid last year by both schools in the Trust to the Government for additional funding.

IT

The holidays also saw significant work to our IT systems updating the network so that students and staff moving across both Robert Carre Trust (RCT) sites can access their files with one login wherever they are. This will be a significant improvement especially for our sixth

formers. The network is updated to Windows 10 as well whilst 26 brand new PC stations have been installed in the Design and Technology area. This will benefit all students during their Design and Technology lessons as well as those in Years 10-13 studying Business GCSE or CTEC.

Some of this work is thanks to the generous commitment by parents to the RCT fund.

You will see the pen portraits of some of the new staff joining us this September but you may also like to be aware that the following members of existing staff take on the following roles this year.

YEAR 7 GEOGRAPHY FIELDTRIP TO SKEGNESS (JULY 2019)

Students and staff alike enjoyed the annual Geography fieldtrip to Skegness during the last week of the summer term. The weather was kind, allowing students to complete both human and physical fieldwork in the sunshine.

In groups they were able to explore the impact of tourism on the town by awarding environmental quality perception scores to different locations.

On the beach students looked for evidence of coastal management and drew field sketches of hard and soft engineering strategies. The highlights for many students were designing and creating sustainable coastal defences in the sand and role-playing a pebble being transported by longshore drift along the coastline.

KSHS Celebrates Achieving the National Wellbeing Award for Schools

Staff and students at the High School are celebrating being awarded the prestigious Wellbeing Award for Schools.

The national award, accredited by the National Children's Bureau (NCB), recognises best practice in promoting the emotional wellbeing and mental health of both students and staff.

Assessors visiting the school in July commented on the open and knowledgeable approach of staff and the success of training given to them. "The profile of wellbeing is high amongst both staff and students... parents speak highly of support offered to their children with staff going the extra mile to meet the needs of students".

Students themselves were part of the accreditation of the award commenting to assessors on how the school was "close and supportive... one big family".

As well as offering support to students and staff when they face challenges that affect their emotional wellbeing the school was praised for its proactive approach to making sure students and staff felt confident in looking after themselves.

Particularly noted were the presentations to students from the charity 'Think for the Future', the availability of the wellbeing team of staff at 'the House', the shelf-help area in the Library, the wellbeing boards around the school, the growth mindset awards and the active student council with its wellbeing sub-committee.

This academic year sees the introduction of 'Wellbeing Wednesdays' for students as well as continued efforts to keep good mental wellbeing as high on the agenda as physical wellbeing.

Our thanks go to Mrs Tipper and members of the staff wellbeing team for overseeing the successful award accreditation.

Mrs Tipper said:

"I am thrilled that the school has achieved the Wellbeing Award – it has recognised all the continuing hard work of the staff in looking after the Mental Health and Wellbeing of not only the pupils but of their colleagues as well".

"Mental Health and Wellbeing is one of the biggest challenges facing society today therefore educating everyone to look after themselves and each other is vital".





You said...We did....

Some of you were kind enough in May 2018 to complete a parental survey via Survey Monkey. It asked a range of questions about your impressions as a parent of the school and its effectiveness as a place of learning for your daughter(s).

You may therefore be interested in this update of four key findings from the surveys:

- 1. You asked how parents could have a wider role in their child's education
- 2. You queried the impact of KSHS joining forces with Carre's as part of the RCT and the resourcing and financial benefits this had brought
- 3. You asked about the curriculum at the school (which subjects students in particular years are taught) compared to other schools
- 4. You were interested to learn more about the Governance arrangements of a Multi Academy Trust In newsletters last year (they are all available still on the school website) we have tried to keep you updated on some of those queries. Number 4 for example was addressed in a piece by the Executive Head Mr Law.

Over the next three editions I will try to cover the others specifically in turn.

How can parents of KSHS students have a wider role in their child's education?

Some parents find it much more difficult to be as involved in their child's education as their daughter starts secondary school. Mostly because the students themselves are keen to find independence and girls are brilliant about telling you what's gone wrong and not always about what's gone right! Getting the right balance is hard sometimes so at KSHS we are active in trying to involve you when it matters and work with your daughters to find ways for them to be academically and socially independent in gradual steps as they progress through the school. Some of the actions we have taken since the survey include the following:

1. Do be sure to register for WEDUC our parent school communication system App and set notifications up on your phone. We realise it is another APP but we use it to send all sorts of important information home including your child's tracking reports, letters about trips, permissions forms as well as the regular newsletter. We are happy to help you get going or provide technical assistance. Just call the school office.

- 2. This year we have tweaked our reporting systems to parents. Please look out for the new style tracking reports on your daughter's academic attainment and progress against her targets, as well as her attitude and effort to learning. They are sent three times a year for most year groups.
- 3. This year we are redesigning our Year 9 options information evening so that parents can talk to a wider variety of teaching staff face to face about the content of the GCSE syllabuses in each subject.
- 4. We have also introduced an additional 'Settling in to GCSE' evening for parents of Year 10 students.
- 5. We encourage parents to use the school planner to communicate with staff or simply to keep an eye on the work your daughter has been set to do at home. You can find more detail about what topics your child is studying and the work they will be assessed on on our curriculum website pages here
- 6. A vacancy is available this year for a new parent governor. Please look out for more detail in due course. This role helps set the strategic direction of teaching and learning in the school.
- 7. We are very fortunate as a secondary school to have an active Parent Teacher Association that does great work in raising funds for the little extras in school. Please do drop Bronwyn.fleming@kshs.uk a line if you would like to be involved. New members are always made very welcome.
- 8. Advice on a range of school issues (including information about the curriculum content your child studies and how we assess your child) can be found on our school website along with all our newsletters which contain regular updates, diary dates.
- 9. You can load the school calendar onto a personal device if you wish. Please visit the school website for guidance.
- 10. We are keen as a school to ensure that any concerns you have about your daughter's learning are addressed promptly. Please see our Home School Communication Policy about what you can expect as a parent.
- 11. We are keen to praise all students for getting things right: in and outside the classroom. Look out for the Growth Mindset and subject recognition award postcards we send home, ask your daughter about her achievement point score or look out for the invitations to our 2 annual prize giving ceremonies in the Summer and Autumn terms.

YEAR 8 TRIP TO GERMANY

On the 10th of July last academic year, 88 members of Year 8 got the amazing opportunity to go to Hellenthal, a small town in the West of Germany.



To get to this scenic town we all had to get on 2 coaches and drive three and a half hours down to Dover, where we proceeded to get a ferry to Calais. We drove another two hours to get to Brussels, where we stayed overnight in order to break up our journey before continuing to Hellenthal.

Upon first arriving at our hostel in Germany everyone was restless and therefore very excited to start the activities. We all got the opportunity to go on a high ropes course and to then choose between ladder climbing, giant swing or tree climbing. All of these activities were scary but so much fun and were a real opportunity to challenge ourselves. After unpacking and dinner we got the chance to do various night activities such as volleyball and sensory trail in which one person must guide their blindfolded partner around a forest trail marked by rope. All of these activities were not only great, but allowed everyone to build trust, friendship and leadership skills. After an exhausting day of travelling and fun, everyone retired to their rooms in order to sleep in preparation for the day ahead.

The next day everyone got to do three activities: look around Hellenthal and explore features to help

us with our social geography, look around a fascinating 16-buttress dam and visit the local wildlife park/bird sanctuary.

In Hellenthal we used more of our geography skills to look at all of the facilities the town had to offer and evaluate different things such as crime rates, facilities for locals and tourists and the environmental quality. We also had to use our German skills to order ice cream from a local shop! Later we got an engaging tour, both inside and outside of the Olef. The dam holds around 20 million cubic metres of water in its reservoir and was built between 1954 and 1959 (but has since been reinforced twice) to supply drinking water to locals and to prevent floods in the valley.

The wildlife park was yet another huge highlight of the trip. We got the opportunity to see many animals from fallow deer to llamas, warthogs and parakeets. We also got to see a bird of prey display and go on a short train ride around the park. The display was very impressive and showcased many of the great birds there. We ate a classic German dinner there: salad, Schnitzel or Currywurst.

The next day we unfortunately had to make our long way back home again. After the lengthy and tiring journey, we got home ready to sleep!



LOCKDOWN PLAN FOR THE ROBERT CARRE TRUST

At some point during this first term the school will carry out a lockdown drill, which is simply getting everyone into a safe place and sealing the exits. It is often referred to as 'invacuation'.

In July 2017, the teaching union NASUWT called for all schools to have a concrete protocol to be used in the event of a dangerous event happening on or near the premises, and in practice, more and more schools are adopting a 'lockdown plan'.

Ofsted also provides recommendations about ways schools should consider their security requirements and how to achieve them. One of those recommendations happens to be the use of the lockdown procedures in order to provide robust security at a moment's notice.

Lockdown might be required if:

- There is local air pollution due to a nearby fire or chemical release.
- There is a dangerous animal in the grounds.
- There is an incident of civil disturbance in the area that might affect the school.

Lockdown might be implemented if:

- There is an aggrieved, disturbed or intoxicated person trying to gain access to the school.
- There is an intruder on the site.
- There is an internal threat from a student.

Do schools have to have a lockdown procedure?

At the moment, the Department for Education does not compel schools to have a lockdown plan; however, legislation does require schools to take appropriate measures to keep users of the school site safe.

Over the next few weeks we will work with students and staff to help them understand more about what our lockdown procedure is, what is expected of them and why we are adopting one for the Robert Carre Trust.

I hope that this information is useful to you and therefore can be used to discuss this topic with your son/daughter at home. We need to practice our lockdown procedures with students in the same way that we practice fire drills. If you are concerned that your child will be alarmed by practicing lockdown, please be reassured that we will take care not to frighten the students.

The whole concept of social media relies upon users having friends and/or followers. 'Friends' tend to be those with whom users will share their own personal profile. It's usually a mutual relationship with both parties able to engage and interact with everything their friends post online. 'Followers' on the other hand can typically be just one-way relationships and, dependent on the platform, only provide access to certain aspects of an individual's profile, such as a person's content feed. A common trait that often exists between the two however is the desire to gather as many friends or followers as possible.





What parents need to know about SOCIAL PRESSURES LINKED TO NDS & FOL





POSSIBLE 'FRIEND ENVY'

Children may compare the number of friends or followers that they have with their own online friends and people they know. In some cases, this could lead to 'friend envy', particularly if they see this as a sign of popularity. This could lead to your child showing signs of jealously and resorting to sending friend requests to people they don't know that well, or even strangers, in a desperate bid to increase their own status online.

OPEN DOOR POLICY



Another way that children can increase their following is by leaving their accounts open so that they can be easily found, and anybody can view their posts. This is in the hope that other users will like their posts and decide to follow them, therefore increasing their numbers. Once again, this can leave your child vulnerable to being followed by strangers or people who have dishonest intentions.





COLLECTING 'FAKE' FRIENDS

Children who feel under pressure to Children who feel under pressure to increase their friend count or want to increase their friend count or want to increase their following as quickly as possible can be vulnerable to collecting 'fake' friends. They may, for example, accept friend requests from people they don't know very well or from complete strangers, inadvertently leaving themselves open to online bullies, trolls or even the possibility of being groomed.

CONSTANT NEED TO PLEASE

As children start to gain more friends or an increasing number of followers, they might start to feel an added level of pressure to provide them with more interesting and likeable content. Almost as if they now have an audience waiting, this constant need to please may be an extra burden that pushes your child into oversharing personal information or posting material that is inappropriate or offensive, inaccurately portraying what they're actually like in the offline world.



FEELINGS OF REJECTION

Just like increasing friends and followers can bring a sense of happiness and satisfaction, so the loss of friends and followers can cause children to suffer feelings of sadness and rejection. Depending on how invested your child is in their social media activities, this could influence their attitude and behaviour offline and potentially have a negative impact on their mental health and wellbeing.







Safety Tips For Parents







BE THEIR FRIEND OR FOLLOWER

The best way to know who your child is friends with online or who follows them is to be their friend or follower yourself. This will allow you to see who your child is engaging with most online or open up discussions about how they know certain people they've added to their network who you haven't heard them speak about before or you yourself don't know.

BEHAVE ONLINE AS THEY WOULD OFFLINE

Your child's behaviour online should always be treated as an extension of their behaviour offline. Discuss with your child the pitfalls of trying to be somebody they're not and that trying to please everybody will only make them unhappy. Tell them that they should be proud of who they are and that they should always behave in an appropriate and responsible way when posting content online.

TURN ON PRIVACY CONTROLS

All social media platforms have their own privacy controls which can be used to help protect children online. For instance, removing the ability for strangers to comment on public posts or having a screening process for friend or follow requests is good practice which can help to ensure your child's experience online is a safer one.

Social media can often distort what true relationships and friendships should actually be like. It's important to teach your child the value of true friendships and that meeting and speaking to people face to face in the real world, offline, is often a better way to build a more trusting and confident relationship with someone rather than just speaking to them online.



TALK ABOUT STRANGERS

If privacy measures have been put in place, then usually your child will receive a notification if somebody tries to befriend them online. Talk to your child about making sure they don't open up their personal life to people they don't know and that if they are ever in any doubt, they should never accept a friend request from a stranger.

TALK TO THEM ABOUT THE VALUE OF REAL FRIENDSHIP

DISCUSS WHAT BEING POPULAR ACTUALLY IS

A higher number of followers can be a measure of popularity but can also lack substance beyond just the number itself. Discuss with your child that popularity can come and go and that a large number of followers doesn't necessarily mean a large number of friends, particularly online where the real value in a relationship cannot be accurately determined.
