# Ian Dawson, Historian, Speaks to Year 13 History Students


On Wednesday 20 January 2021, Year 13 History students were given the opportunity to hear Ian Dawson, a historian lecturer, on the War of the Roses. Ian Dawson's lecture was about Why was Richard III unable to secure his hold on the crown? He explained a range of factors to the students and emphasised the main reasons for his demise. This was a brilliant way for students to revise and recall a previous topic they have studied. Ian Dawson also provided the students with an individual, John Hoton from the 1480s, that they could relate to and could follow the story of a man who benefitted from Richard of Gloucester's usurpation of Edward V. This personal element provided students with the opportunity to bring History alive. Ian Dawson is the author of one of the core textbooks that is used in

school and this experience was a privilege for them. He will be doing a lecture for Year 12 students later this year.

# Year 8 Virtual Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) Day

Our annual STEM day looked a little different this year! STEM days at KSHS are a fantastic way for students to get hands on with various activities and learn about where a career in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Maths) could take them.

The MEP (Marine Engineers Pathways), Newcastle University, and the RAF were all able to provide virtual workshops for the whole of Year 8 on the 4 March. Workshops included "Girls in STEM", "24 hours in A & E", "Paper build challenge", "Colourful Chemistry", "STEM in the RAF" and "Marvellous Maps".

Students were able to learn about careers as well as get hands-on in some building challenges, such as building trebuchets with everyday household items. One of the many fantastic builds is shown in the image.

Next year we hope to be able to welcome our guests in to school for a similar event.

Students still wishing to get involved can, by entering the poster competition. This year's poster competition is to produce a poster about 'innovating for the future'. 

The library is once again fully open and welcoming our students for book borrowing, reading, independent study and homework club. In a busy first week back, it has been heartening to see so many students happily browsing and borrowing physical books and enjoying the library environment once more.

Throughout lockdown the library continued to give remote support to students; regular book chatter amongst our community of book worms ensured that the enthusiasm and enjoyment the school normally has for reading was maintained. Less confident readers were also supported with individual book recommendations and tips on how to develop and maintain a good reading for pleasure routine. The Ebook App has been a vital resource providing continued access to books for those students unable to get hold of physical books, and the Book Bingo Challenge was a popular online activity that encouraged reading beyond normal comfort zones and genres.

There are some fantastic new titles added to the collection whilst students have been learning from home, Including twenty titles from the 2021 longlisted Carnegie & Kate Greenaway Children's Book Awards. It is vital that our school collection provides an up to date range of fiction and non-fiction and alongside a back catalogue of classic fiction and curriculum supported texts, the school library must always strive to curate a diverse and inclusive range of titles that reflect and introduce our students to a world beyond their own. International Women's Day has been the perfect opportunity to celebrate this by highlighting a range of books that support pioneers, innovators, and female authors both historical and contemporary.

The complete school library catalogue may be viewed remotely or in school via the student online learning link on the school website; Eclipse is the library management system we use and it allows students to see which books are available in the library, the latest arrivals, book of the week, or to catch up on library news and reviews - all of which can be useful for students when planning what to read next or searching for books to support their learning.

Finally, a reminder that students may once again access the library for homework club after school. Monday - Thursday until 5pm and Friday until 4.30pm.


