If we were in any doubt about the Government's agenda to give more young people the chance to study in a Grammar School the message was made clear by Theresa May herself on Wednesday evening when I was fortunate enough to meet her along with other Grammar School Headteachers in a reception at the House of Commons. Many Heads there were describing the significant oversubscription of pupils registering for a place in their schools. I felt very lucky in the knowledge that for the past few years, any student who meets the 11+ standard and wishes to be educated at The High School has been able to access a place.

I felt very pleased too to learn how well many of the Year 7s seems to have adjusted to life at the High School during this first term. It was lovely to meet so many parents on Tuesday evening and to read your comments about your daughter's confidence and enjoyment of High School life so far. Thank you for taking the time to fill in the feedback forms. A couple of you asked about the extra-curricular activities. We publish these in the newsletter towards the start of each term and students were all able to attend the Fresher's Fair too to see what's on offer. 'MAKE YOUR MARK'

Students took part in the annual 'Make your Mark' vote again this year which is held to determine the topic of discussion in the House of Commons when the Youth Parliament spend the day there in November.

This year 652 students voted with 135 votes being cast for 'First Aid lessons for all in school'.

The results have been sent off to the Youth Parliament and have been added to the votes from around the country to choose the 5 debate topics; nearly 1 million students across the country voted and the 5 topics to be discussed on the 11th November are: Education, Racism and Religious Discrimination, Public Transport, Votes at 16 and the Health Service.

Our students voted in the majority for First Aid provision for all. This year, students in Year 7, 8 and 10 will have a CPR session run by the St John Ambulance Service as a part of the Government's commitment to provide some training to school-age pupils. Students in Year 9 and 11 had their Basic First Aid training last year. We are also offering a full day's training in First Aid; please see the letter sent out recently for more details.

Student Voice Values Your Views

The School Council aims to provide a means for the student body to voice their improvements or concerns that they may have about the school. This is done in a fair and democratic fashion with students presenting and discussing their ideas in tutor time. These agenda items are then taken to the year councils who decide on what they would like discussed at the following whole School Council meeting. This term our agenda has included items such as the provision of water fountains around the school, lockers and their maintenance, dining choices and the queuing system in the canteen, as well as more specific agenda items such as Wireless network for Sixth Formers and printer credits.

There have been some positive outcomes of these discussions which include the updating of the wireless system as well as the refurbishment of toilets around the school site. Also as part of these discussions members of the council have also visited Bourne Grammar School to view their locker solutions and water fountains in an attempt to gain inspiration for our own school. The priority queuing system has been reinstated and this now means that all students (in years 7-10) are able to have a least one week out of four in which they take priority in the queue for lunches.

We continue to discuss these topics at meetings and welcome the attendance of Mr Allen (Operations Manager for the Robert Carre Trust) in order to bring about the best solution for the entire school body.

Geography Field Visits

The Geography department has been busy getting their students out of the classroom and experiencing the delights of data collection. During this term the Year 11 Geographers have visited Rotherham and Sheffield and were lucky enough to receive a walking talk by Rotherham's Town Council team. The team discussed the different strategies that Rotherham has tried to adopt to stem the tide of shoppers leaving the town to shop in other larger out of town retailing areas such as Meadowhall. Rotherham is in fact subject to the highest proportion of competition from out of town shopping in the country.



The town has had to adapt and diversify to help improve footfall in the town and as part of this diversification new experiences such as Grimm and Co have opened up as well as an old fashioned sweet shop and temperance bar. The girls even had the opportunity to test out a traditional temperance drink of sarsaparilla. Students then visited different zones around the town to gather data on the built environment, pedestrians and land use. They also asked members of the public about their opinions on Rotherham's town centre developments and the competition from Parkgate and Meadowhall.

The students were an absolute pleasure to work with and gained valuable insights into a town that is very different from their home town of Sleaford. The data they have collected will now be used as part of their GCSE Controlled Assessment and students are now busy preparing graphs and presenting the data in a variety of ways in their Geography lessons.



Year 12 will also be out and about gathering data during the last week of term and will visit

Boston, Freiston and Skegness to collect data to support them in the field work component of their A Level examination, more on this in the next newsletter!

Year 11 Berlin Trip



On Friday the 7th of October, just over forty History GCSE and German A-Level students travelled on a school trip to Berlin. We went to experience German culture and to further understand the bitter reality of life during the Second World War.

As a GCSE student in both History and German, I found the trip incredibly useful. Visiting Berlin is helpful for learning a language, as despite most people being able to speak English they much prefer you attempting to speak their's.



Being in the actual place where history happened has an effect which cannot be described or taught. It gives someone a completely different outlook on what they are studying. Seeing the differences still visible between East and West Berlin and walking along that line in the pavement knowing that that is where the wall once was, and walking through a building where history is still being made today, are all things which make a huge and lasting impression. You can't avoid feeling the great impact of the place you are in.

One really great part of the trip was the Resistance Museum,

which is based in what was the residence of Claus von Stauffenberg, the German army officer who led the 1944 plot to remove Hitler from power. Here you can also see the exact spot on which Stauffenberg was shot. The collection in this museum was far too vast for us to see everything, however what we saw informed of the resistance amongst the young, the religious and the Nazi in abundance. A large revelation was the number of people actually involved in Stauffenberg's plot, as he is generally painted (on the rare occasions in which he is even mentioned) as a lone rebel; however there were various people involved in the plot, and there is an entire wall dedicated to them in the museum, though not many were executed.

Despite this, the experience which most affected everyone's emotions was the trip to Sachsenhausen, a concentration camp just outside Berlin. Here you can still see the remains of the ovens used to burn the carcasses of people murdered at the hands of the Nazis, the medical laboratory in which they were experimented on, and the cell in which various objectors to the Nazi regime - including Martin Niemöller, a famous religious rebel - were kept.

This trip, (when we weren't busy moaning about how much we were expected to walk) was enlightening and enjoyable for all. I would seriously suggest it for anyone considering GCSE History.

NKDC'S Local Democracy Day

On the 12th of October, a selection of pupils from Year 9 were asked to go along to North Kesteven District Council's Youth Democracy Day and represent Kesteven and Sleaford High School.

In total there were four schools present: KSHS, Carre's Grammar School, St George's Academy (Sleaford) and St George's Academy (Ruskington). The schools were mixed and put into several different groups; four parties backing four political candidates, a press group, a residents group, and the polling team. We all represented communities and people required for local democracy in politics. All students had their own important roles to play in the day; I was an agent, and my job was to make my political candidate look the best. Before we were put into our groups we were given an introductory quiz on politics asking us about law, party logos, party members past and present, and democracy around the world. The winning team came from Carre's Grammar school with 31 out of 36 points!

Following the quiz we were sent off into our roles and groups. The four parties were set on the task of creating their manifestos and marketing material, with the help of teachers and council members from NKDC. We needed to create an inspiring party name, slogan, three key issue pledges, and our candidate's speech. This was alongside our election campaign material which involved handmade rosettes, posters, and even – for our party 'Lincs Future' – a walking billboard!

After all groups had prepared we took part in a political 'hustings' event, where the candidates were required to give their speech to the crowd of students. Once all the speeches had been made, the press and residents grilled the candidates and asked them challenging questions about their key issues and plans for the future; for example, the young politicians were asked what they thought about CCTV and whether it is an anti-crime strategy they would back if they were in power.

Next, we took part in a 'vote with your feet' activity. We were asked to vote 'for' or 'against' topics such as 'banning social media in school' or 'the EU referendum'. For each question, some people represented 'non-voters' who forgot to register in the vote; it was clear that those who don't register can really affect the overall democratic vote.

Once the main votes of the day's election were tallied the results were clear: The Future Party got 82 votes with their candidate Adam Duffy of St George's Sleaford. The Kesteven Youth Party got 91 votes, with KSHS's own Youmn Alsheikh Ali (9NP) as their candidate. The Lincs Future Party got 98 votes overall. The winners, however, were the Rise 4 Life party, with a total of 104 votes for Charlie Patterson of St George's, Ruskington!

Overall, I was surprised at how enjoyable the day was; it showed me that I actually do know quite a lot about politics. My party, Lincs Future, came a proud second overall and our pledges mainly revolved around an idea I had come up with concerning the Bass Maltings renovation plan. This event allowed me to prove to myself that I can socialise well with strangers my own age, and that I can voice my opinions and be heard! I'd definitely recommend that pupils go along to political events like this and gain an insight into local democracy.
